It is supported by a comprehensive educational package that uses interactive discussions, an educational guide, teacher training, and in-class activities to send the message and to assist in the delivery of the core curriculum in the areas of sexual health and violence prevention.

63% of sexual assaults reported to police involve girls under the age of 18.

The Story Line:

The girls and guys are concerned about image, popularity, and sexual conquest at The Big Party. Felicity's judgment is clouded by alcohol and inexperience. She finds herself first tormented by her controlling boyfriend, and then raped by the guy who seemed to want to help her.

What can Felicity do to stand up for herself and avoid having unwanted sex? Can her best friend help her? Will you?

Curriculum and Policy

The content of the play, the activities and the conversations focus on core curriculum and exercise higher level thinking. Far From the Heart was developed with students and with input from educators and social service providers. Some of the curriculum and policy links include:

Health:

Grades 8 - 10

focuses on understanding sexuality, body image, gender roles, interpersonal relationships, and the development of attitudes, beliefs and values related to identity and relationships

Healthy Living:

demonstrates, in a variety of settings, the knowledge and skills that reduce risk to personal safety; fosters life skills; engages inquiry based decision making; uses concrete strategies to help students develop decision-making skills

Society:

explores gender issues and language, bullying, alcohol misuse, conflict and change

Arts Education and Drama:

Grades 11 -12

exposes the participants to a unique form of theatre - forum theatre - and a new application which is internationally recognized as innovative and groundbreaking; a play which originated in workshops with youth shows the social and cultural impact of the arts

Forum Theatre problem solving skills

Far From the Heart, developed in collaboration with a group of teens under professional direction, aims to help youth recognize the different forms of pressure and violence in dating relationships, and explores the issues that lie beneath this behavior.

The play presents problematic scenarios that end in a dilemma to deliberately stimulate audience members into action. Forum Theatre is a type of **interactive theatre** created by the innovative and influential practitioner Augusto Boal as part of what he called his "Theatre of the Oppressed". In this

process the audience members can stop a performance, often a short scene in which a character is being oppressed in some way. The audience suggests different actions on-stage in an attempt to change the outcome. As a result, people gain knowledge useful in everyday life to resolve conflicts, negotiate relationships and avoid risk, and thereby gain problem-solving skills.

A half-hour **discussion group with professional counselors and peer facilitators** immediately follows the show.

Teachers are integral contributors, preparing students in advance, and then helping them integrate the information.

your students' ideas our program format

The Full Program includes the following components.

Step One: Preparation

- teacher and facilitator teleseminar training
 - review the show, activities and the Educational Guidebook filled with resources and engaging lesson plans.
 - learn what to do if a student reports an assault.
- in-class preparation and interactive discussions led by teachers in the days before the show

Step Two: Presentation

- theatre forum presentation (about **90 minutes**):
 - 5 minute introduction by The Joker: includes the “rules of engagement”
 - 20 minute scripted play performance layered with problems
 - 60 minute forum with audience improvisation and interactions to solve the problems, facilitated by Joker
 - 5 minute final wrap by Joker
- post-show discussion with social workers from community agencies and peer group youth leaders (**30 minutes**) connects students with local resources as they process the play and express ideas

Step Three: Integration

- vital in-class post-show activities, led by teachers in the days following the show, set the students in motion to create and organize their own anti-violence endeavours, integrating, applying and extending their learning, and helping to build a safe, healthy, and compassionate environment.
